# Readings

### Titus 3:1-8

3 Remind the people to be subject to rulers and authorities, to be obedient, to be ready to do whatever is good, 2 to slander no one, to be peaceable and considerate, and always to be gentle toward everyone.

3 At one time we too were foolish, disobedient, deceived and enslaved by all kinds of passions and pleasures. We lived in malice and envy, being hated and hating one another. 4 But when the kindness and love of God our Savior appeared, 5 he saved us, not because of righteous things we had done, but because of his mercy. He saved us through the washing of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit, 6 whom he poured out on us generously through Jesus Christ our Savior, 7 so that, having been justified by his grace, we might become heirs having the hope of eternal life. 8 This is a trustworthy saying. And I want you to stress these things, so that those who have trusted in God may be careful to devote themselves to doing what is good. These things are excellent and profitable for everyone.

## Matthew 5:14-16

14 "You are the light of the world. A town built on a hill cannot be hidden. 15 Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house. 16 In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven.

#### Reflection

This week's theme from our discipleship pathways series – and our final one – is Live. It's about how we live as Christians, and I suppose all the other themes – pray, tell, care, worship and learn – are leading into how we live, they all inform our behaviour and show how we live as Christians, as disciples of Christ, as people on a journey.

So how do we live as Christians? How do we act as the light of the world, as instructed by Christ? Does this mean that we never swear, we never gossip, we never do anything wrong - and even if we do it doesn't matter because we are forgiven and saved?

Well let's look at how we live – regardless of religion or belief. Initially we start with our families – our parents, siblings, spouses and children. We work, and maybe we save money for the future. We go on holidays, try to have a nice house, find a job that satisfies us, a vocation that helps us to live well and hopefully provide a pension. You may look at how you spend your money, whether you wish to save something to leave to the next generation as inheritance, or you may just want to spend it all on yourselves- I'm not here to judge! I think generally speaking people are good – people want to live a safe, happy life. They want to be able to feed their families, put a roof over their heads, live in love beside others.

So, what's the difference if we live as Christians? Don't Christians still do that? Yes, we do that, we still want to look after our families, of course we do. But, we also do things for others too. Now, this isn't to say that those outside of the church don't help others too, they also donate to foodbanks and work in charity shops etc, but I want us to think about what the difference is, why we as Christians do those things. The difference is that Christ is at the centre of it, and

recognised as being at the centre. But when it is started in the church environment, then it becomes a Christian endeavour – because the people involved have 'invoked' – if that's the right word – Christ into the centre of it. Christ is in those situations already of course, but when they are being worked on by Christians, who recognise that Christ is there, it becomes all the more powerful because of testimony, because of faith, and because of showing how we live for and with Christ. The people have seen that this thing needs to be done to help, and so they have gone to church in prayer and to God and said 'how do we help with this?' They have then listened to God, and waited for the Holy Spirit to show them what needs to happen next, and they have followed.

In the short verses from Matthew, we heard Jesus telling his followers to be the light of the world, and that instruction feeds down to us too. Through the ages, people have needed to be light – to be the beacon that others can see otherwise the stories would be lost. The knowledge that we have of Christ would not have filtered down to us. We only know about Jesus because those people who were there were the light that the people needed to see. They somehow got people to listen, to wonder at their faith, and to ask questions. At some point people have said 'we need this writing down for future generations' and so some people did that. The first disciples had the light of Jesus in them, and it showed - people saw that they were the light of the world, and they asked questions – 'who is this Jesus you follow?' 'Why do you follow him?' 'What's in it for you?' And in that vein, we must also follow. We must be the light of the world now, so that the light of Christ will be seen in us. And people might see the light of Christ in us by how we live, how we behave.

A question for you – is living a Christian life the same as being Christlike? For me, it isn't, because when I think I'm supposed to be Christlike it just makes me feel a little bit sick! You all know me, I've been here for 5 years now and you know I am not the most confident of people, but to say that I might be Christlike, is just silly. We all make mistakes, we gossip or we spend too much money, we don't donate as much as we should, and we know that all those things would never happen to Christ. However, we are not Christ, and the only thing we can do, is try to live as Christ would, as Christ instructed. There is nothing more we can do than that. We try. We read the Bible, and we try to understand what Jesus said, and then we do our best. Maybe Christlike is too hard for us to try, we get scared that we'll fail, so we try to be as Christian as we can. We serve, feed the hungry, visit the prisoner, try to help where we can, which gets us closer to being like Christ.

In the reading from Titus, we hear the writer telling us to be obedient, to do whatever is good, to be peaceful and considerate – to be gentle. Sadly, we still live in malice and hate, and the world is not at peace, there is envy and hate. The reading ends by telling us that doing good is excellent and profitable for everyone. And we know that don't we? It is good to help people because we've helped people, but it is also good to be able to know that we have made a difference, whether by handing out a bag of shopping to someone at the foodbank, or handing out cups of tea to the guests at the wellbeing café, we get a sense of our own personal wellbeing, knowing that we have helped. This reading tells us something of how we are supposed to behave because through Christ we are forgiven and saved, and so we need to act like it. Others need to see how we live and why we live as Christians, so that they can maybe wonder, and ask the questions.

These discipleship pathways that we've been looking at, have come out of the initiative from the Church, the Methodist Way of Life, and I hope you've seen that it isn't really different to a Christian way of life, we just do it as Methodists. Still Christians, but we follow the justice seeking initiatives of the Methodist Church which came to us from John and Charles Wesley. The Methodist Way of Life is not new, it's not something radical, its just a simple way of setting out what we believe and who we are, and how we show what we believe and who we are. We need to show all this, in order to be Christ's light in the world. Perhaps the Christian way of life could simply become 'a way of life' for all people, wouldn't that be wonderful?

These discipleship pathways that we've been thinking about for the last few weeks, and the ones we've looked at over the last couple of years in this circuit, are ways in which we can increase our

discipleship, help to focus us on Christ's teaching and how to let others see what it means to be a Christian.

Jesus says in Matthew 5 that '...you are the light of the world...' and he wasn't just talking to the people standing near him. He meant us. He meant you. We are to be the light of the world, to show people what it means to be Christian, to be followers of Christ, to love Christ. Christ is the light of the world, and through him we are to show that light, to be the light.
