# 2<sup>nd</sup> Reading 2 John 3:16-21

<sup>16</sup> 'For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.

<sup>17</sup> 'Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him. <sup>18</sup> Those who believe in him are not condemned; but those who do not believe are condemned already, because they have not believed in the name of the only Son of God. <sup>19</sup> And this is the judgement, that the light has come into the world, and people loved darkness rather than light because their deeds were evil. <sup>20</sup> For all who do evil hate the light and do not come to the light, so that their deeds may not be exposed. <sup>21</sup> But those who do what is true come to the light, so that it may be clearly seen that their deeds have been done in God.'

## Today's Message

As the election looms in just a couple of weeks time, one of the things that might help to determine which party / person you will vote for (and please use that democratic freedom to vote!!!) is considering just what are the issues you care passionately about?

Is it education, the NHS, immigration, the cost of living, taxes, the environment, the elderly, the homeless, justice & equality or perhaps the issues that you care about the most is pot holes.

All of those things are things that we should care about but there are other important things too. We should care about our relationship with God, care about our relationship with others and even our care about our relationship with ourselves.

## Why care about God?

Well simply because God cares about you. Passionately. God cares about every little bit of you. And God wants the best for you.

One commonly heard phrase these days is 'Live your best life,' an exhortation to live the best life that you can, one that makes you happy and allows you to reach your full potential. And that is exactly what God wants for you. Because God cares.

And sometimes it's easy to forget that. It's easy to think of God as all powerful, all knowing, all wise and wonderful, someone who can create gnats (small insects) and galaxies with equal measure. But to also think that such a great big God also cares for us, all of us, is perhaps harder to grasp.

And yet we have read in John's gospel, possibly one of the, if not the most famous verse in the bible...for God so loved the world (cared for) that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.(John 3:16)

God cares about us, cares about how we care for each other and even cares about how we care for ourselves.

So Let's sing about this Great Big God, who holds us in his hands!!

### Why care about others?

Well simply because we are commanded to do so. When Jesus came into the world I think he did so with a purpose...to restore our broken relationship with God but also to deepen and strengthen our relationships with each other. And throughout his ministry he demonstrated just how we should care for each other in and through how he cared for those he came into contact with.

Quite often they were people who had been pushed to the very edges of society, people who had been made outcasts, people who were told repeatedly that they were unworthy and as a result possibly started to believe that about themselves.

And yet these are the very same people that Jesus appears either to make a B line for or else invited to come and gather round him...widows, orphans, children, those with mental health issues or physical disabilities. Not only does he do that but he expects his disciples to do the same so much so that he offers the ultimate demonstration of what it means to carry out a servant ministry.

During the very last night he spends with them, he takes on the role of the very lowest servant in a household and washes their feet...now as you think about that, just imagine what state your feet would be in if you had walked about your local area in a pair of loose fitting sandals all day...yuck!!!

And after doing this menial task, as the disciples look on God-smacked, he tells them that this is how people will know they are his disciples, if they love others as he has just loved them. If they care for others as he has just cared for them

So let's sing about that new commandment now

## Why care about ourselves?

Hand up here how many people like to be pampered? How many people like to be looked after? How many people like to know that they are cared for?

All of us I suspect. We all like to offer care to those we know and love and we also like to know that others care for us.

Now what I don't mean is when we often use the phrase 'someone has gone into care' which implies that an individual is no longer mentally or physically able to care for themselves and that they need help to do that task.

What I am talking about is the day to day care we all enjoy receiving and can give to ourselves. So what form might that take?

Taking care of yourself by thinking about what things we put into our bodies...food, drink, harmful substances

Taking care of yourself by thinking about your mental health and maybe taking time off our screens and social media where we can fall into the trap of just comparing ourselves to the 'perfect ' lives everyone else seems to be living. And I haven't even mentioned the trolls on social media who can make lives a living hell.

Taking care of ourselves by treating ourselves...a trip to the hairdresser or having our nails done...despite the cost of living that is one area where business has boomed.

Taking care of ourselves by setting aside time and space for a hobby. Making sure we get the school / work / home life balance right.

And sometimes taking care of ourselves involves saying No. Saying 'no' to things we are asked to do because to say yes would mean we are taking on too much, spreading ourselves too thin and simply not looking after ourselves.

Caring for yourself is about learning to love yourself...just as you are. It's about allowing yourself to be and become, the very best version of you that you can be. It's about allowing the person God created you to be, the one made in God's image to flourish and grow. One designed to have a heart for God and for others, a heart full of joy, peace and love.

So today as we begin week 4 of this six week journey though these Discipleship Pathways, let us think about how we can care about God, care about God's world, care about each other and care about ourselves. Amen
